

## **Author Visit: Jaspreet Kaur**

I was on the front row of students in the Sports Hall, sitting with my friends, excited for the imminent talk. At the time, I didn't know much about Jaspreet Kaur – I had seen posters of her most famous book, Brown Girl Like Me, around school in preparation for the Literacy Festival, but I hadn't had chance to borrow it – yet I was glad to be there all the same. I find that I always enjoy and learn so much from the author events – but I did not expect to be so moved and inspired by this one.

remember Jaspreet Kaur walking in, smiling, standing before us as she began to deliver her presentation. She started by talking about herself today. A writer, teacher and awardwinning spoken word poet who recently performed at the Royal Albert Hall. A mother to a baby daughter - a 'brown girl like me', she said. A brown woman with an incredible career. She touched on her experiences growing up as a young brown feminist in Britain; she talked about her book, giving a brief overview of the different sections it covers and the many different issues it tackles. She then moved on to giving us all some advice as potential writers: how to start with an idea, how to get that idea published, how to get your voice heard and on the scene. All the way through, she engaged with us; reminded us that we didn't have to fit into one category, that we could be what we wanted and who we wanted.

My friends and I left the room inspired beyond belief – we all shared a sweet, beautiful feeling of belonging. Things are definitely improving, I believe, but I do feel that British South Asian women

are so under-represented when it comes to the media, the arts and literature in this country, and so seeing a British Indian woman stand up and become a part of all of that moved me to my core. It made me feel represented.

So, it was a stroke of luck, really, when I saw a copy of Brown Girl Like Me sitting on a shelf in the school library afterwards. Pretty much instantaneously, I made the decision to borrow it, and I am so glad I did.

Her book is so bold and brave, beautiful and honest; talking about so many issues in society which I think we all need to be discussing. She also wrote about them in a way that gives us hope: when she wrote about racist microaggressions, she also spoke about how we can change society for the better; she

acknowledged some of the more negative aspects of social media, and then went on to discuss how we can use it as a platform for progress. And although the target audience for the book is probably more for a 'brown girl like me' (pun intended), I truly believe that everyone who can get a copy should read this book. The more diverse the voices out there are, the better. The more we discuss difficult issues, the better. That means change, in the right direction.

I would just like to say a huge thank you to Mrs Jowett and Mrs Lorton for making these author events happen. I feel the whole school really does take so much from them – I know I do – and without you, they wouldn't be possible.





## **Author Visit: Simon James Green**

With our Literacy Festival only recently finished, I thought it would be interesting to interview one of the authors who came in to find out more about their lives, writing and, of course, their books.

Simon James Green grew up in a small town in Lincolnshire, and found his passion for writing with scripts before setting his sights on novels. Green has written over ten books since his book, Noah Can't Even, debuted in 2017, which was listed as one of the most important LGBT books of the last 50 years by WHSmith and longlisted for the Branford Boase Award. Those in Years 7-10 had the opportunity to hear Green speak in person and attend a book signing, but prior to the festival, I had the chance to speak to Green about books, inspirations and experiences. But why did Green,

a future lawyer, choose to start writing?

Section 28, a law introduced in 1988 and ended in 2003, banned schools from keeping books or content containing LGBT material, and this meant that Green felt like he 'never got to see people like me in books growing up'. As a result, Green decided to write the books that he would have loved to see in libraries growing up, and that would have helped him throughout his teens.

As any budding authors would understand, personal experience is a huge contributor when writing, and this is something Green believes is important too. He states that 'there is a little bit of me in every character I write,' and when asked what he uses for inspiration, he said it could be anything from situations he had been in to people he had met. He also believes in including topics

that are important to him, such as LGBT themes and issues and, quoting from his talk, he wants his books to be like a 'mirror of the real world.'

If you yourself are an aspiring author, journalist, screenwriter or if you just enjoy writing and are looking for advice on how to improve, Green thinks the key is just to read and write a lot! He said that 'it doesn't matter if it's just for you and no one else reads it,' because any form of writing, from scripts to short stories, is the way to 'figure out what your voice is and what works on the page.' He is also quick to remind us that disappointment and rejection is a normal hurdle to face along the way, but despite that, although it's difficult to pursue writing after hitting a barrier, don't give up. 'Keep going, keep knocking on those doors and keep believing in yourself!'


# Students collaborate on film project as tribute to children's book
