Welcome to the March edition of our newsletter, the second half of the spring term has only been five weeks long and it has flown by! As we approach the Easter holidays, it is a good time to reflect on all that has been achieved in the first two terms of the academic year.

On 28th February the Year 9 curriculum evening took place, with students and parents invited into school to learn more about the GCSE option subjects. It was a very well attended event supported by many of our current Year 10 and 11 students who volunteered their time to share their experience of studying GCSEs. It was great to hear them share their enjoyment and enthusiasm for learning!

Since February half term we have experienced several disruptions to our usual school routines. Despite the snow on Thursday 9th March we remained open although many students and staff experienced challenging journeys. Whilst we initially planned to open, rapidly changing weather and worsening road conditions meant school was closed on Friday 10th March. There were also two National Education Union strike days on Wednesday 16th and Thursday 17th March, which meant that we were only open to supervise vulnerable students, the children of key workers and for Year 11 and 13 students who wished to study at school.

In between the disruption was the amazing school show, 'Legally Blonde: the musical'. The primary school performance took place on Monday 13th with students from Court Farm and Maney Hill as the



first audience. There were then four shows on Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings with an additional matinee performance on Saturday afternoon. The show was fantastic, it was wonderful to finally see the result of all the months of rehearsals and the hours of practice. With the biggest ever cast, it was brilliant to watch so many students from each of the different year groups working together create such high-quality performances. I am sure it is an experience that all members of the cast and crew will remember from their time at Sutton Girls.

The longstanding tradition of Sutton Girls' charity fundraising continued this half term. On Friday 17th March, Aquila held their charity event which raised funds for Comic Relief. In addition to the traditional cake sales, there was an impressive beauty hamper raffle and a very entertaining teacher version of 'Taskmaster'! As always,

there were high levels of student engagement and a significant amount of money raised.

With some of our students fasting during Ramadan, the Inter Faith group put together slides for the weekly theme presentation shared in tutor times in the week of 20th March. The informative presentation considered fasting Ramadan and following their discussions about the common ground that exists between different religions. Students have also worked hard to put together the third edition of the school newspaper 'The Sutton Scribbler' which includes a variety of different articles researched and written by individuals in Year 8 upwards.

I hope you enjoy reading about what has been happening recently at Sutton Girls. Have a lovely Easter holiday.



This included research about the environmental efforts that World Challenge have factored into our trip, including carbon neutral flights as well as the smaller things we will focus on whilst we're in country to ensure that every landscape we visit is left as it was upon our arrival. Another important lesson surrounded the many benefits of volunteering our time but equally

the responsibility we each have, to ensure the work we do reaches the right people.

Of course, packing our backpacks was a big part of the day. Would you believe we're each taking just three t-shirts away with us? I can honestly say I have never packed this light! However, I am sure our future selves will appreciate these conservative efforts when the views of rainforests and mountain ranges aren't dampened by aching backs and arms.

Many of us have booked in our vaccines ready to go and this weekend we focused on the key symptoms of different tropical diseases so we can be equipped for any situation. However, above this we truly bonded as a team and discovered each other's fears and hopes for the trip and there was a palpable sense support and friendship in the room.
